November: a month of 'blues' - or of realism?

"Thirty days hath September, April, June and dull November...." Others may remember that mnemonic I learnt in primary school about the number of days in each month. (I won't bore you with the rest of it...) The point is that we always assume November to be 'dull'. It could be the coming of colder, wetter weather; or that the clocks have just gone back, making it very dark by about 5.30pm – or could be also be fact that Christians have always linked the month with death?

We Catholics call it the 'month of the Holy Souls', based on the celebration of All Saints on Nov. 1st, then All Souls on Nov. 2nd. Most of you reading this won't be members of my Church, but most Christians do celebrate All Saints – based on the hope given by Jesus' resurrection that there is life after death. In his strange vision we call the Book of Revelation (or Apocalypse), St John writes in chapter 7, verse 9: "I saw a huge number, impossible to count, of people from every nation, race, tribe and language; they were standing in front of the throne (of God's presence) and in front of the Lamb" (That is, Jesus in glory.) Originally, by the "huge number", the writer meant those who had died in persecution; but most nowadays interpret it as meaning all good people.

But one sense of 'persecution' is still kept by everyone this month: the commemoration of Remembrance Sunday. We think with solemnity and gratitude of those who died in the service of others – mainly in the two world wars and in conflicts since; but also of those serving the community in a more general way. The original date referred to the exact moment when the First World War ended – the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. The way it rolls off the tongue has a simplicity and dignity that is hard to match. The ghastly slaughter of the Western Front in 1914-18, coupled with the barbarity of the Axis powers in 1939-45 have left an indelible stamp on our consciousness. Remembrance Sunday is far from a gloating over victory: it is a celebration of relief from tyranny and from the awful effects of a total lack of humanity. It also commemorates human bravery and many acts of self-sacrifice for others.

This year, Remembrance Sunday is November 13th. Up and down the North Tyne and in Redesdale, there will be celebrations at the many memorials and in the churches and chapels, usually at 11am. Although many will involve Christian clergy, the services are aimed at people of all religions and none. When shells and bombs landed, they did not distinguish between religion, race or language! Everyone was in it together, and that is how they should – and will – be remembered.

On a slightly less respectable note, the end of October involves 'Halloween'. Older people like myself are still amazed how this American fad has taken over – almost eclipsing Guy Fawkes in young people's imagination. The actual phrase means "The Eve of All Hallows" i.e. All Saints. so it really refers to October 31st. In one sense, it's mainly harmless fun for primary-age children to dress up as witches, ghouls, etc. Mind, the movies from the USA meant for high-school students appear (to me, at least) a bit less innocent – they seem to aim at being both scary and slightly salacious at the same time. I wonder how many young people grow up thinking that the witches, spooks, and so on are a real portrayal of what religion is meant to be?

Enough sermonizing from me! We hope and pray that our very rural electricity supply system does not suffer the same problems as it did this time last year! Advent starts on the 27th of this month, as Christmas Day falls on a Sunday, so I wish all readers a happy run-up to the Festive Season.
