Dear Friends

Did you see on the BBC news a few weeks ago, a piece about one of Newcastle's most deprived communities really struggling this winter? There were photos of a family; a single mother with three children to keep. She was full of loving determination to care for her family and keep them all warm, clothed and fed against great odds.

The Food bank that she had contributed to herself in recent years had now become her lifeline! As the cameras panned over the scene inside the church that hosted the busy gathering of customers and helpers, I realised that Sarah and I had been to that very place the week before. The huge and grand interior of St James' Benwell, now sadly in poor condition, is housing such a vitally important project, run by those who have very little themselves. The place was full of goodwill and bustle.

The reason I was there was to help Sarah facilitate a Pastoral Care course run by the diocese, enabling people with plenty of life experience to listen to one another and be alongside one another in a positive and meaningful way as they tussle with what life is throwing at them: physically, emotionally and spiritually.

Here, physically, we found food and advice given; emotionally, warmth and welcome; spiritually, kindness and hospitality. That grand cavern of a church has become the warmest of hubs.

I found myself deeply moved.

Jesus 'came to visit us in great humility' and here before my eyes were hard-working, life-saving, comfort-giving ordinary people doing extra-ordinary acts full of loving kindness with great humility.

Safeguarding: A Course near you.

“Oh no! Not a safeguarding course. Not for me!”

A couple of months ago, that was precisely my reaction. However, I was quickly reminded that as a Church Warden I should attend. Indeed it was an obligation and duty.

As the date approached when I should go I became even more grumpy.

In the days when I worked I had attended many courses on Safeguarding.

Post 2012 I had accumulated more DBS and Safer Recruitment

Certificates than there have been Secretaries of State for Education.

Before arriving for the sessions [two parts over three and a half hours, excluding a coffee break and held at Simonburn Village Hall] I had completed the pre-course reading, the necessary ‘reflections’ and finished the writing tasks. Strangely by that time I could almost admit to a slight shift in attitude.

Our course was led by Carol Butler, Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser, supported by Andy Brittlebank, Deanery Safeguarding Officer, and Rural Dean Sarah. There were ten course attendees.

The content, though harrowing at times, was aimed at giving tools and knowledge with which to recognise safeguarding issues in the context of our roles within our parishes, and take appropriate action. It was based on an holistic understanding of what is meant by “Safeguarding” and rested upon our beliefs, values, knowledge and practice.

Time passed quickly with video, reading and discussion. Our superb leaders gave us time to reflect, tease out our questions and concerns or just to remain silent with our thoughts. I believe all course members appreciated the approach and were mutually supportive.

Churches must be safe and secure for ALL especially the vulnerable of whatever age or level of health. We have a duty to promote a safer church where the relevant information should be visibly displayed.

I returned home humbled and certainly better educated. I had turned 180%.

A distant memory resurfaced: A schoolmaster once said to me, “David we are all supposed to live and learn, sadly some just live.” I have always wondered into which category he had me.

From Bishop Mark

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I am delighted to let you know that the legal process enabling Bishop Helen-Ann Hartley to become our new Bishop of Newcastle continues on 3 February when her Confirmation of Election takes place at York Minster. In the weeks following this, Bishop Helen-Ann will travel to Buckingham Palace where she will pay homage to His Majesty the King, and on Saturday 22 April at 3pm her Installation Service as thirteenth Bishop of Newcastle will take place at Newcastle Cathedral. Details of the service will follow in due course, but you may wish to hold this date in your diaries. I hope as many people as possible will be able to join us in person for the service; it will be livestreamed on the internet for those unable to attend in person.

In the period between Bishop Helen-Ann's Confirmation of Election and Installation, her focus will very much be on getting to know our diocese in more informal meetings and gatherings, and she will not pick up her formal duties as Bishop of Newcastle until after her installation has taken place. In the meantime, at Bishop Helen-Ann's request, I will continue to be responsible for the day to day running of the diocese, as I have been since Bishop Christine's retirement.

Please do pray for Bishop Helen-Ann and Myles as they prepare to move home from Yorkshire to join us here in Newcastle Diocese.
